### **Visionary book sheds new light on ancient mysteries**

*Houston, TX—November 2007—In his new book, A Whole New World—The Gospel According to Revelation, (Nordskog Publishing, 2007), teacher and independent theologian Greg Uttinger invites readers to consider the book of Revelation as theologians have viewed much of prophetic Scripture over the eons of time: past history, present reality and future hope.*

For those who want to mine the riches of the book of Revelation without the baggage of preconceived symbolism or hard-line imagery explanation, *A Whole New World* is a must-have excavation tool. The only requirement is a desire to allow the whole of Scripture to interpret Scripture in the same way theologians have done with other doctrinal studies for years, using Uttinger's little book as a guide.

*The Gospel According to Revelation* is both a proclamation of God's imminent actions during the time of and among first century Christians, as well as a foretelling of the glorious future Christians can yet look forward to in the fulfillment of God's covenant promises to His people. "The book was immediately relevant to and practical for John's first century readers," Uttinger states, "and it is profitable and practical for us today."

In his book, Uttinger goes chapter by chapter demystifying John's descriptions of the roles of Satan, Babylon the Great and the harlot in the immediate as well as ongoing history of the Church; the significance of the seven letters not only to the historical churches of John's day, but also to Christ's Church as "that redeemed, sanctified people who worship together in the presence of God"; the Lamb of God who alone is able to open the book with the seven seals; the radiant woman, the beast and the mark of the beast; the millennial kingdom; the final defeat of Satan, and the New Jerusalem, or Whole New World ... putting forth a "reasonable and realistic interpretation" of a highly misunderstood book of the Bible, according to Publisher Gerald Nordskog.

Speaking on behalf of *A Whole New World*, Jim West, Associate Professor of City Seminary in Sacramento, CA proclaims, "Mr. Uttinger's book provides a framework by which we can read the entirety of the Revelation with profit" regardless of the age or spiritual maturity of the reader. Uttinger does this primarily by explaining Old Testament metaphors and symbols that would have been clearly understood by the Apostle John's New Testament readers in clear, economical twenty-first century language. "Revelation assumes that we have read the rest of the Bible and paid attention," Uttinger states. "For the images it uses are Biblical ones."

"And so the kingdom has come," Uttinger says, "and the kingdom continues to come. And one day, when Jesus returns, the kingdom will come in all its eternal glory and fullness."

Greg Uttinger has been teaching systematic and Biblical theology to high school students for 25 years, the past 11 of which he has spent at Cornerstone Christian School in Roseville, CA. He has written web and print articles for the Chalcedon Foundation – including Christianity 101: The Theology of the Ancient Creeds – and a number of handbooks on theology, history and literature.
